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anger management, violence, and its impact on the community and the family system. The objectives of our curriculum meet the state-mandated, specific requirements for female offenders. This 36-week open-ended group allows for flexible entry points.

- Topics:
- Educate the offender about what domestic violence is
- Confront the offender's pro-criminal and violent attitudes
- Educate the offender regarding the change process
- Identify and confront the offender's issues of power and control
- Increase the offender's process of problem-solving
- Teach the offender self-management techniques
- Each class combines state-of-the-art information with experiential and written exercises designed to enhance skill development and reinforce learning. Each group length is one-and-a-half hours in length.

Three Birds Alliance provides pathways to healing and hope for individuals and families impacted by domestic violence. Established in 1979, Three Birds Alliance is the only 24/7 shelter available in the City of Aurora and Arapahoe County, offering emergency shelter and extended-stay care, together with a crisis line, and licensed counseling. Learn more about domestic violence and how to stand up to it, and join us by volunteering your time or providing financial support to help create a culture that values healthy relationships.

- Services Include:
- Emergency Shelter and Extended Stay Care: Emergency shelter housing for adults and children fleeing domestic violence is available for up to 30 days, and Extended Stay care housing is available for up to 90 days.

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- Non-residential counseling: Professional one-on-one and group counseling services for domestic violence victims and their dependent children to address trauma, improve safety and support healing
- Court Advocacy Program: Victims of domestic violence receive information on options and support from trained advocates throughout court processes. Case management is provided for follow-up services and care.

- Social-emotional support groups
- **Path to Healthy Relationships (PATH)** flagship education program series, taught in middle and high schools across the Denver Metro area. Grounded in trauma-informed and culturally responsive practices, PTHR equips students with the knowledge and skills to build safe, respectful relationships in all areas of life—family, friendships, dating, and online. Through interactive lessons, students learn about communication, consent, boundary-setting, emotional regulation, conflict resolution, and recognizing unhealthy behaviors. The program is designed to be engaging, developmentally appropriate, and relevant to the lived experiences of the youth we serve, helping them make informed choices and prevent relationship violence before it starts.
- **Social Emotional Learning Facilitation (SELF)** PAVE's small-group program designed to help youth build the emotional and social skills they need to thrive. Offered in schools and community settings, SELF provides a supportive, peer-based environment where students practice self-awareness, self-management, relationship skills, and responsible decision-making. Guided by trained facilitators, participants explore topics like coping with stress, building self-esteem, managing conflict, and fostering empathy—skills that improve mental health, strengthen relationships, and boost academic and personal success
- **True Man** PAVE's healthy masculinity program, developed in partnership with the Denver Broncos to engage boys and young men in redefining what it means to "be a man." Through interactive workshops and honest dialogue, participants examine the impact of gender norms, learn to express emotions in healthy ways, and practice building respectful relationships. True Man fosters empathy, self-respect, and accountability, empowering participants to challenge harmful stereotypes and become positive role models in their schools and communities.

DOVE works with Deaf, DeafBlind, DeafDisabled, and Hard of Hearing (DDBDDHH) people of all ages and backgrounds who have experienced abuse. Abuse includes: domestic violence, family violence, sexual assault, child abuse, adult survivors of childhood sexual abuse, bullying, stalking, and teen dating violence.

If you need our advocacy services, DOVE advocates will:

- give you emotional support
- pay attention to your feelings, and respect where you are in your journey
- make sure you feel empowered in your decision-making process
- review opportunities with you
- be by your side through processes that you choose to engage with (legal system, medical services, domestic violence shelters, etc.)
- advocate for communication access

DOVE also operates a hotline, available 24/7 to support the crisis needs of DDBDDHH victims/survivors, their loved ones, and service providers. Our hotline is **303-731-7874** and is a VideoPhone (VP) number; if you are using a VP you will connect directly with one of our advocates. If we do not answer immediately, please leave a message with your name and a safe way for us to reach you. If you are not using a VP, you will automatically connect to a Video Relay Services (VRS) interpreter, who will interpret the call free of charge. You may also reach us via [email](#) but please keep in mind the VP number is usually the fastest way to contact DOVE.
